

Bowman's Hill

Wildflower Preserve Field Trip

When: Sunday May 18th at 2:30 (please arrive by 2:15)

Where: Bowman's Hill Wildflower Preserve, 1635 River Road, New Hope, PA 18938 (<http://www.bhwp.org>)

Directions (from points West; this route takes you through New Hope):

Take U.S. Route 202 North to PA Route 179 (Bridge Street) for 1 mile to New Hope, PA. At the traffic light turn right (south) onto PA Route 32. Continue south on River Road (PA Rt. 32), for 3.5 miles. Entrance to the Preserve is on the right.

*Alternate Directions (This shortcut **does not** go through New Hope):*

Take U.S. Route 202 North about one mile past Peddler's Village to the first traffic light, Aquetong Road. Turn right on Aquetong Road and follow for about 4 miles, crossing Route 232 (Windybush Road). Aquetong ends at River Road (PA Rt. 32). At the stop sign at River Road, turn right. Entrance to the Preserve is immediately on the right.

What: Guided tour covering the history of the preserve, native plant identification with a focus on native pollinators. Home to nearly 1000 plants native to PA and over 80 rare and endangered species, trails wind through woodlands along a pond and Pidcock Creek where you'll enjoy an abundance of seasonal wildflowers and other native plants, birds and wildlife.

Cost: \$6.00 per person

Also: native plants are available for sale, visit an arboretum, a library, the Platt Bird collection, go birding and view other indoor exhibits.

How long have you been a beekeeper?

My wife Michaelen and I have had bees for five years.

How many hives do you have?

We currently have three in one apiary in our backyard, though we have had up to eleven after a particularly active swarm year. We generally split our hives in the spring to help reduce swarming and then recombine them in mid to late summer in preparation for overwintering.

What influenced you to become a beekeeper?

It's hard to say what originally put the idea into my mind. Bees have always been fascinating creatures, but keeping them never really seemed like something "normal" people did. The specific trigger was probably the fact that we had been baking a lot of honey wheat bread for a couple years and thought we could save money by having bees instead of buying honey. Still, it was something we really hadn't considered actually doing until we saw Jim Bobb at a public event and talked to him about beekeeping. He mentioned that he taught a beginner's class and I quickly convinced myself that it would be a good hobby to take up. Michaelen was a tad resistant to the whole idea, so we got a few books to read including "Beekeeping for Dummies." This book was particularly reassuring and gave her the confidence that we could keep bees. A few months later we were putting together equipment and purchasing packages. Of course, I'm still not sure that it's something normal people do!

What is your favorite part of keeping bees?

Working on the hives on a warm spring day. The smell of the hive, the gentle hum of the bees, and the warmth of the sun make it particularly enjoyable.

What has been your biggest challenge as a beekeeper?

Swarms, swarms and swarms. Last summer we did much better, but in our first few years, we seemed to be far better at making bees and climbing up in trees to catch them than we were at producing and harvesting honey.

Do you have a couple tips you could pass along to less experienced bee keepers?

- Take Jim Bobb's class and listen to his advice. Don't try to do too many experiments the first and second years. It's best to just get your hives established and strong.

- Learn the signs of disease and be vigilant. Register your hives with the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture; your inspector is there to help you.
- Wear a veil, stings on the face are one of the worst parts of beekeeping and they are easily avoidable.
- Tell your friends and colleagues about bees and the importance of agriculture to our lives. It's unfortunate that many people don't know the difference between honey bees and yellow jackets, and thus claim to hate "bees."
- Remind people that the best place to keep honey is out on your kitchen table, not hidden away in the cupboard.
- Come to some MCBA meetings and volunteer to help out. There are a lot of beekeepers with experience willing to share advice and help you. This year we are trying some new ideas that you can find in the calendar section of this newsletter. In general, meetings are on the second Tuesday of the month. Even months are MCBA meetings in which we will have a speaker or activity followed by a very brief business meeting. Odd months will be MCBA board meetings during which the officers, board, and anyone willing to volunteer meets to plan meetings and vote on club business.

What do you do when you're not working with the bees?

At home I am usually out in the yard taking care of chickens or working in the garden or woods. At work I'm an electro-optical engineer. In my current employment, I work for a small company that is using machine vision, interferometry, and other laser-based measurement to make CNC machine tools and other automated equipment more precise.



The Eastern Apicultural Society (EAS) Summer Conference

Hello All Beekeepers!

*As president of EAS for 2008, I would like to extend an invitation to beekeepers to attend **EAS 2008 in Murray, Kentucky, August 4-8!** Murray is located in the extreme western tip of Kentucky. If you are traveling to the conference by car from the North or East you will pass within a few miles of the Walter T. Kelley Company, the Kentucky Horse Park, Mammoth Cave, Fort Knox, The Frankfort Branch of the Dadant Company, and numerous State Parks, National Recreation Areas, lakes, and campgrounds. Murray is home to Murray State University, which has an enrollment in the neighborhood of 10,000 students. The western end of Kentucky - known as the Jackson Purchase region - is definitely "Southern" in lifestyle and attitude, with the accompanying friendliness, hospitality, and cultural foods that are traditionally associated with the South. Murray is located 15 miles from Kentucky Lake, where there are dozens of campgrounds available for those interested in the outdoors. Both Kentucky and Barkley lakes are well known as great fishing territory for any anglers that want to take advantage of the opportunity to fish new waters. For the quilters in the crowd, Paducah Kentucky, with the National Quilter's Museum, is less than an hour's drive from Murray. Those travelling from the Northeast will find traffic almost nonexistent compared to urban areas near the East Coast. The Mississippi River is an hour west of Murray, as is Reelfoot Lake, which was formed by the great mid-west earthquake of the early 1800's.*

All of these sights are interesting destinations, but the main purpose of EAS is furthering our knowledge of honeybees, beekeeping management, and products/services related to beekeeping. There will be the usual cast of the "best of the best" researchers, teachers, and speakers for our learning needs. I encourage each of you to make the trip to western Kentucky next August 4-8. Enjoy the laid-back atmosphere and the genuine hospitality that I grew up with,

and increase your knowledge of beekeeping while having a good time.

Since its foundation in 1904, the **Pennsylvania State Beekeepers Association** has lobbied against adulteration of honey, crusaded for research to understand and control introduced parasites, promoted control of diseases and pests through integrated pest management techniques, disseminated information on modern practical apiary management to maintain a healthy honey bee pollination workforce, and educated the general public on the importance of honey bees and other beneficial insects.

Today, the Pennsylvania State Beekeepers Association assists beekeepers in all 67 counties of the State and encourages and assists new members to start beekeeping and increase the honey bee population to provide pollination for both agribusiness and the residential gardens of this Commonwealth.

PSBA members receive a monthly newsletter with timely articles and local advertisements. The association holds a summer picnic that is hosted by local bee organizations around the state and a two day annual meeting and banquet in November with national and international speakers. Beginner Beekeeping Class

Once again we are offering the Beginners Beekeeping Class. Do you know of anyone that is interested in raising honey bees but is a little nervous about getting started? Have you just started raising bees and are interested in learning modern management techniques? Perhaps you have been raising honey bees for a few years and just want some refresher techniques. Or maybe you have questions about what your hive is doing. For the ninth year, the Montgomery County Beginners Beekeeping Course offers classes that are timely to your seasonal beekeeping needs. **The 2008 course continues a tradition of hands-on beekeeping at the Montgomery County (Skipack) 4-H Center Apiary!**

When: Classes are usually held on the **last Tuesday** of each month from **February to September**; exceptions are the March class (3rd Wednesday) and the June class (4th Monday). Classroom activities start at **7:00pm**. Hands-on activities in the apiary start at **6:00pm**. Please bring a face veil if you have one.

Attendance: The course does not need to be taken in its entirety. You can start midyear or attend individual sessions. The 6:00pm activity in the apiary is optional – if you cannot attend, just come for the classroom portion at 7:00pm.

Where: Montgomery County 4-H Center, 1015 Bridge Rd (Rte 113), Skipack, PA 19426.

Cost: The cost for the course is \$10.00 per household for the year. If you have already attended the class in previous years, there is no additional charge to attend refresher classes this year. It is also recommended that you join the Montgomery County Beekeepers Association (MCBA) and the PA State Beekeepers Association (PSBA) to receive newsletters and participate in club activities.
